# **Rockers roll to Boatnik fastpitch crown**


For the second year in a row, the River City Rockers of Sacramento, Calif., went unbeaten to win the Boatnik Men's Fastpitch Softball Tournament championship.

The Rockers, who went 6-0, beat Portland Fast Pitch Club 8-1 in Monday's championship game at Riverside Park.

The Rockers had beaten Team Jones of Medford 6-4 during a Monday afternoon semifinal game and started the day with a 20-2 victory against Mock Mazda of Grants Pass.

Portland Fast Pitch beat Brotherton Pipeline, the last of four Grants Pass teams standing, 4-1 in the other Monday semifinal.

The Rockers and Portland Fast Pitch Club each had one of two co-most valuable players and one of two co-most valuable pitchers. Catcher Mario Pereira of the Rockers shared co-MVP honors with designated hitter

pitcher in the tournament cham-Ed Gasper, the winning pionship game for River City,

was honored as one of the tourney's top pitchers, as was Portland's Matt Barnes, Gasper's counterpart in the championship game.

The Rockers had three players named as all-tournament selections, including outfielder Mark Summers, Rob Penticoff and infielder David Bostick.

Infielder Pat Sorenson of Mock Ford was an all-tournament selection, as were infielder Jeff Weiss and pitcher Morgan Mapes of the Grants Pass Bandits, outfielder Ryan Wilson and third baseman Kevin Ray from Brotherton Pipeline, third baseman Josh Agnew and first baseman Scott Nokes of Team Jones, and outfielder Ryan Daly and first baseman Jeff Farrell of the Portland Fast Pitch Club.

First baseman Gary Lyons from Northwest Old Growth, a team from Portland that competed in the Masters' pool, was also an all-tournament choice.

A total of 67,427 raffle tickets were sold, grossing \$215,776, including \$68,353 in bighorn sheep tag raffle sales. Winners of the special tags enjoy an extended season and expanded hunting area.

The fourth-seeded Kuznetsova defeated Aiko Nakamura of Japan 6-2, 6-3 before the rain interrupted play.

"I was first. I was lucky with that," said Kuznetsova, the 2004 U.S. Open champion. "I get in my match, so I have the rest of the day to relax."

Safina, seeded 13th, defeated Kateryna Bondarenko of Ukraine 6-1, 6-3.

"I'm really happy that I could go through in two sets, especially before the rain started," said Safina, who missed the Italian Open with a back injury.

And then there's at least 40 minutes worth of commercial time for every game, while teams often stretch the breaks between innings with promotional stunts, music and videos to keep short attention spans up.

It all adds up to nine inning games averaging nearly three hours, up 18 minutes from 1981. Games like the one the White Sox and Angels played in 2:05 on Sunday are the aberration when they once were the norm and, even with that quickly played contest, games averaged 2:58 on Sunday, compared to 2:28 the same Sunday in 1968.

Blame part of that increase on simple greed. Baseball added another television commercial between innings in 1985, which

increased games at least 10 minutes, and there are even more in the playoffs. Each World Series game last year averaged 3 hours, 46 minutes, ending on the East Coast long after most kids had been ordered to bed.

Predictably, both players and managers reacted to the enforcement effort by either making fun of it or saying it wasn't necessary. Tigers manager Jim Leyland did both, first by saying he can't hurry to the mound because he smokes three packs of cigarettes a day, and then adding

that part of the allure of baseball is that it doesn't have a clock like other sports.

"To me a baseball game is like a movie," Leyland said. "If it's a good movie, you stay. If it's a bad movie, you leave."

If people keep seeing too many bad movies, though, they stop buying tickets. Selig seems to grasp that idea, even if the people on the field don't.

Maybe this time the umpires will do us all a favor and play along. Who knows, they might even call a high strike or two.
