TELECONNECT TOURNEY

Cedar Rapids-Teleconnect of Cedar Rapids, the defending ISC World Champions, won their own round robin event on July 22-24 by beating the Farm Tavern of Madison 4-0 in the final. Teleconnect went 4-1 in the 3 day event while the Farm was 3-4 but won two in a row on Sunday after going 1-3 on Friday night and Saturday.

The New Zeland National team finished third (3-3) while Penn Corp and Decatur were both 2-3 on the weekend.

The Most Valuable pitcher in the event was Michael White of Teleconnect and the Most Valuable Player was Steve Kaiser of Teleconnect. The top hitter was Kerry Johanson of the New Zealand National team.

It was a great tournament for fastpitch softball fans as 5 or 6 of the top ranked pitchers were on hand.

Dennis Yeskie: PROFILE OF A WINNER

His big right arm would whirl around like a flywheel of a powerful
engine and the softball would come
flying in at the catcher at more than
100 MPH! That is the way the batters
seen it over the career of one of
Wisconsin's best ever softball pitchers, Dennis Yeskie. The Dennis Yeskie
stories will never end in Wisconsin.

Pitchers are regarded as very good when they retire 70% of the batters they face. Very few Major League baseball pitchers top this figure. A state softball newsletter charted Dennis Yeskie from 1971-76 in league play retiring 67.5, 70.7, 76.8, 80.9, 81.0, and finally an amazing 83.7% of the batters he faced! Once the 80% mark is reached you are marked as one of the best in the nation.

As a teenager he pitched a local Hixton beam into the finals of a local tournament. He was the youngest pitcher in the area to hurl his team into the finals. He lost 5-4 to one of the top teams from the Western Wisconsin area. A few years later, pitching for Mindoro he won the Men Class B (now Class A) state championship. The next five years he would pitch Hixton Club 95 to consecutive Class A champion-ships. His record is 6-0 in Class A state championship games.

The tall right hander pitched a total of seven games in one day in the 1975 Class A state tournament never allowing more than three hits. The ironman performance earned Club the state title and its first national tournament berth. Club 95 finished fourth of 37 teams going 5-2 in the national town-ment in Hamilton, OH. Yeskie and his teammates would go on to appear four times for a total of 13 wins. The thirteen wins is the most by a Wisconsin pitcher at the national tournament level. Twice he earned ASA All-American honors.

Getting up for the big game was never a problem for Yeskie. He fired a perfect game agains! Portage Sarbackers in the 1977 Class A state meet enroute to a MVP honor. Two years later he no-hit the Michingan state champion in the Great Lakes Regionals and was named Best Pitcher of the meet. Through 1987 he had posted 8 no-hitters in league play alone which made up only about 10% of the Club 95 schedule. He had 40 shutouts and the next highest mark by any pitcher in West Central Wisconsin was 19!

He beat down every "label" thrown at him by his critics. A typical year would be like 1975. He hurlad Club 95 to the longest consecutive winning streak in the Dairyland League's history 52 games! The team won four of six tournaments entered, were runnerup in the nationals, Yeskie fanned 571 in 467 innings with a 1.00 ERA, and 22 shutouts. The critics were saying he would be really good if he had a changeup! was better than "really good." The year before Yeskie's club finished 60-8, he fired 29 shutouts including seven in a row. He tallied 726 strikeouts in 445 innings.

While pitching at the Class A level the average batter batted only about .130 facing the "heat" Yeskie threw. More than three times as many batters struck out compared to getting a hit.

He joined Antigo All-Car and pitched at the Major level in 1981, two years later he hooked up with Mankato, MN Happy Chef, pitching two years for them. He went undefeated in the Minnesota ISC Travel league. He won 80 games in two years for All-Car and was 33-9 and 27-7 respectively for Happy Chef. In 1985 he hurled for Pogy's Pizza of La Crosse, WI before moving to Nevada. That year he fired a no-hitter in the Eau Claire Classic against his former team, Antigo All-Car. At the major class level Yeskie made appearances in the

Middleton, Wi.-LaPizza Henry J's of Des Moines, Iowa claimed first place at the Class A fastpitch tournament held at the Bowling Green softball complex in Middleton, Wi. over the Memorial Day weekend.

In June it was the Kimberly Merchants taking first place in a Class A tournament held at Bowling Green.

ISC World Tour naments. He was 2-0 in 1984 with Mankato with 19 strike-outs in 14.2 innings.

A few other accomplishments are worth noting. Known as "Barney" to his teammates, Yeskie once fanned five batters in one inning and nine in two innings. The balls went by the catcher as well as the batter!. He once hurled back to back perfect games in 1973. Also, Club 95 was one of the few teams to carry more players on its catching staff than on its pitching staff. Catchers suffered sore hands and broken fingers catching the pitches thrown by Yeskie.

Now living in Carson City, Nevada Dennis Yeskie says his career is over. He suffered a shoulder separation in a car accident making it a bad risk to pitch again. He has expressed a desire to sponsor pitching clinics.

"The pitcher who did not have a changeup, the pitcher who would throw his arm out in two years, and the pitcher who would not do well at the major level," finishes with 650 career wins, beating down all the labels put on him. Besides earning the admired respect and friendship of both his teammates and his opponents, many more people in the US now Know where Hixton, Wis., population 375, is. One word that best describes the 21 year career of Dennis Yeskie is "Class".

The champions

beat Pitches Lounge of Milwaukee to open the tournament and then beat Service Drugs (Cecil Pittack) 2-1. They then went on to beat Wilber Lime of Galesville in extrainnings 2-1 (Wilber played 4 games, 2-2, and all were extrainnings). Trainor then beat The Rice Lake Orangemen before beating Elgin in the championship round. They took home the \$1000 first place check. They had taken 4th the year before.

Elgin battled back through the loser's bracket after losing their opener in 12 innings to Wilber Lime. They beat ERS 10-0, Martin Security 6-4, Avenue Bar, Wilber Lime again, Chief Auto Parts and then Rice Lake before losing to Trainor Grain. Elgin received \$500 for second place.

Rice Lake took third place (\$300) in the tourney and was led by the pitching and hitting of Dave Podmolik and the hitting of Mike Ashlin. They both had 2 homers in the tourney.

Chief Auto parts lost their first game to Martin Security but battled backbattled back to take fourth place in the tournament (\$100). They played 6 games in the tournament.

Denny Rich won all the games for Trainor Grain.

A LOOK BACK IN TIME

KE-NASH-A WINS CHICAGO 1934

Kenosha's Ke-Nash-A softball
(kittenball) team beat the Crimson
Coach Tobaccos of Toledo, Ohio, 2-0
for the National (International)
championship on Monday afternoon,
September 11, 1934 before 35,000 fans

at Chicago's Lincoln Park.

The Chicago American Newspaper and the Amateur Softball Association sponsored the tournament. The first place trophy, bearing William Randolph Hearst's name was valued at \$600. Thirty-two teams played, including the Canadian Champs. The stands were filled, and fans stood eight to 10 deep around the field.

Eddie McKenna (Kenosha News Sports Editor until his death in 1951) wrote the newspaper stories used as sources for this article and these words for the Kenosha News about the champion—ship game, "Bill Pecnick, stocky southpaw sharpshooting slants made the touted Matt Ruppert look like Rube Appleberry in some county farm league with his two hit pitching..."

Pecnick struckout 13 in the game, struckout the side in the 5th, and registered a strikeout in every

inning but the 6th.

Ke-Nash-A scored in the first inning when Pete Bucko reached first on the first baseman's error and then crossed the plate on Norm Derringer's double. The team scored again in the 7th on Jim Dwyer's walk (he was forced at second by George Hansen's infield out), Hansen got to second on an error, to third on Len Baas's infield hit and scored on Pete Bucko's single.

Ke-Nash-A had won five games in

three days.

--Al Linde pitched the opening game victory, a 3-1 affair with Cincinnati.

--Then Harry Kraft struck out 38 batters and allowed only six hits in a 19 inning game with Red Top Beer of

Newport, Kentucky. In the last inning (there was talk of calling the game because of darkness) Len Baas led off with a drag bunt hit, got to third on an error and scored on a fly ball.

--In the third game Pecnick beat Orlando, Florida, 12-1, scoring six runs in the seventh.

--Al Linde struckout 16 to beat Kansas City 1-0 in the semifinal game.

McKenna tells us to note that Soc Wainright (McKenna often made up first names if he didn't know them), Toledo's 43 year-old pitcher, had shutout Phoenix, Arizona, 2-0, in the 14 inning semifinal game that was held on the morning of the championship game. He then returned in the afternoon to pitch against Ke-Nash-A.

Ke-Nash-A had won the state tournament two weeks earlier at Madison, Wisconsin. All of the players, who wore blue and white uniforms, were either from Kenosha or Racine with the exception of Linde, who was an 18 year-old pitcher from Wauwatosa, Wisconsin and apparently, legally picked up for the tournament in Chicago.

The team returned home to play Western Printers of Racine in an exhibition game two days later and lost 1-0. They finished the season with a 61-8 record.

The Ke-Nash-A Club, sponsors of the team, was a goodwill organization for the employees at American Motors (called Nash Motors in 1934).

During the 1934 season lights were installed at Nash Stadium in Kenosha.

The year before, the same bunch of players, called then the Kenosha Miller Beers, finished second in the Nationals at Milwaukee. But that tournament seemed to be mostly made up of Wisconsin teams, plus a couple from nearby states.

In 1935, Ke-Nash-A returned to the tournament to defend its title, but lost in its first two outings to Cincinnati and St. Joseph (Michigan).

Grey was named the Most Valuable pitcher. He teamed up with Mitch Gray to give the Florida team the title. Mitch Gray tossed three shutouts in the tournament. We had Mitch Gray last year. We added Vaughn and that has made us a much more comeptitive team, stated Mike Hazel.

In their first 6 games the Bombers scored 22 runs and won two of the games by 1-0 scores. In both of those games the Bombers scored their winning run in their final at bat. In the championship game the first four Bombers reached base on singles and the team scored 3 runs in the first inning. Grey and Gray allowed only 3 runs in the entire tournament so a 3-0 lead after one inning was all Vaughn Grey needed to lay claim to the title for the Bombers. consecutive singles were by Boomer Brush, Ken Eriksen, David Grimes and Bruce Turner. Chris Haley added a single later in the inning that accounted for the third run.

Mike Hazel singled and scored an insurance run in the fourth inning but Grey didn't need it as he shutout Vorco.

Clearwater's victory earlier on Sunday in the single elimination affair was very dramatic as they trailed 2-0 going to the bottom of the seventh. The Tampa Merchants held the lead with 2 outs and 2 strikes on Eriksen. he connected, however, for a two-run inside the park homer to force extra innings.

"I found a gap and with these large fields you can run forver," stated Eriksen.

(Editor's note) Denson Sexton tied up with Peter Meredith in a game in that tournament that saw both of them toss 1 hitters. Trans-Aire won the game in the bottom of the seventh on a mental error. With 2 outs and runners on

2 and 3 a grounder was hit to shortstop. The fielder tagged the runner going to third out but the plate umpire ruled that the runner from third had scored prior to the tag. What a way to lose a close game!!!

THE FARM REPORT

It is not because of the drought that the Farm Tavern softball team stayed close to home for the first 2 1/2 onths of the season. Aside from a trip to Las Vegas where they finished second to Seattle Pay n' Pak, the Farm hasn't ventured much outside the state of Wisconsin. In fact, count only two trips across the less than mighty Mississippi River to the Twin Cities so far on the schedule of one of the top teams in the country. Surprisingly, no appearnace anywhere on either the Memorial Day or Independence Day 3-day weekends.

Is it a reluctance on the part of other teams to come to Madison in return for the Farm's appearance in their park? Is anyone purposely avoiding the team that placed third in the ISC last year? Is Rod Peterson trying to keep this year's team a secret and sneak up on a few people? Or is he just easing into the heavier comepetition with the hope of peaking at Decatur?

Whatever, by the time August 12 rolls around, the Farm will have faced some of the best in Sioux City, Cedar Rapids, and at home in Madison. And that will be after some pretty impressive results on the slightly abbreviated schedule so far.

The Farm opened in Wausau with one loss, Greg Newton had control problems against Green Bay Tradewinds Pizza. He evened the score the next weekend in the Wisconsin Classic League (ISC), and the Farm went 5-0. The third weekendin May saw the Farm in the Twin Cities (Nirico Construction Tourney), where Rick Paully got the call against Markato because both Mike Piechnik and Greg Newton reportedly overslept. Markato beat the Farm 7-5

but the Madison 9 came back to win the tournament.

After a weekend off, Peterson's charges avendged last year's poor (0-2) showing in Las Vegas by beating Seattle in the winner's bracket final, only to drop two straight to the same team and finish second in the tourney. Shortstop Dave Johnson had an outstanding tournament.

Another 5-0 Classic League weekend followed, and then and early Sunday exit in the Twin Cities at the hands of All-Car and John Charles. Another Eau Claire Championship followed and the tables were reversed on All-Car(both in the winner's bracket final where the Farm won 7-0 in 5 innings and in the championship game where the Farm won in extra innings against Glen Davis. (editor's note: It took the Farm 10 innings to beat Martin Security of Portage, Wi. in their first game of the tourney)

Another weekend off maybe wasn't the best thing to have scheduled. Following the July 4th rest, Charles again bested the Farm in the Classic League forcing a playoff for the automatic berth to the ISC World Tourney in Decatur. The Farm won the first round of the Classic League and All-Car claimed round two. Rising the the occasion the Farm beat All-Car on consecutive nights andMadison returns to the ISC World Tourney for another shot at the title.

Results in the City of Madison on Tuesday and Thursday nights haven't been quite what they could be expected to be. Three losses are on the record, 2 by Wilson's Bar. them was accomplished almost singlehandidly by Joe Williams (who dons a Farm uniform on weekends), he hit for a double and an inside the park home run. A surprising 7-0 loss with kevin herlihy being shelled by Avenue Bar as recorded. It has been observed that Mike Piechnik is probably the team's leading hitter in city league play.

Personnel wise, the team is the same as last year except for pitching and the somewhat miraculous return of the fleet Mike Paulsrud, who missed all of last year with a severe knee injury. Peichnik and Newton hve been very sharp at times, while it's appeared tht Herlihy needs more time

and work to reach maximum effectiveness. Outfielder and DH Jim Soehnlein suffered a broken finger but has returned to puchch out some more hits to contribute to the Farm's attack. John Becker and Gary Backus are behind the plate. Jim Seymour and Tom Kneebone at first, Rick Rada at second, Dave Johnson at shortstop, and Rick Paully at third. Williams and Paulsrud at the top of the battimo order and in the outfield provide the speed. Scott Norris, Mickey Stemo, Neil Bertrum (also at short) and Jerry Welling round out the roster. Peterson seems to be seeing the ball better, both at bat and at first during the week.

Now that the ISC berth is locked up, the most important thing for the Farm is qualifying for the ASA. That slipped by them last year after 5 straight strips, mainly due to an injured wrist Mike Piechnik suffered in the ISC at northerly Saskatoon. It certainly won't get that cold in Decatur. Many will find it hard to believe it's the same tournament, only one year later. Let's hope no one has to go through that again.

FASTPITCH NOTES

The Bailey productions team of Redding is going under the name of the Redding Reds. They had Mike Ash only for a couple of games before he left suddenly and returned to the Northwest.

The Sacramento Spurs are much the same team that has been competing at the A level for years, but they picked up a good pitcher in Dick Acton from the Louisville, Colorado Lasers (editor's note-Acton beat my Martin Security team in Minot, N.D. in 1986 at the ASA A National)

CEDAR RAPIDS SPECTACULAR

Cedar Rapids-Teleconnect of Cedar Rapids won its third consecutive Cedar Rapids Spectacular by beating Happy Chef of Mankato, Minn. 2-0 behind Michael White's pitching. White tossed a two-hitter and struck out 10. Terry Feye's run scoring double in the fifth inning was the margin of difference for Teleconnect.


The tournament is now three years old and White has now earned 2 Most Valuble Pitcher Awards. He was 4-0 in the tourney with an ERA of 1.16. Brian Meyer, also of Teleconnect hit .538 with 6 RBI and an inside the park homer against Fleck's-Miller to earn the MVP award.

Teleconnect fell to Happy Chef on Sunday morning by a 2-0 score. Teleconnect's Al Rebling and Mankato's Al Rausch each tossed 5 hitters but Happy Chef put their hits together and scored the two runs.

Teleconnect then trailed Fleck's-Miller 4-3 but a bases loaded blooper got past both the left and center fielder and Meyer raced home with his inside the park homer.

In the tournament finale, White and Greg Bosch of Happy Chef were both perfect through the first three innings. Teleconnect got on the board in the fifth inning when Andrew rapped out a two-out single and Feye followed with his double.

Fleck's-Miller was third for the third year in a row. They beat Waterloo for that honor 1-0 behind the four hit pitching of Jerry Schleim through 5 innings and Warren Gichard's two perfect innings of relief.

EAU CLAIRE CLASSIC

Leau Claire-The Farm Tavern captured its 7th consecutive Eau Claire Classic Championship and their 9th in the last 11 years. The Farm went

through the tournament unbeaten but did not have an easy time of it in every game. Martin Security of Portage beat Rustic Bar of Duluth and then took on the Farm in Madison's first game. Dan DuCharme of Martin Security held the Farm in check through the first nine innings before Rick Rada Walked and Mike Paulsrud doubled in the top of the tenth inning. Jim Seymour then singled home Paulsrud and the Farm won 2-0 in 10 innings. Kevin Merlihy started the game for the Farm and was relieved by Mike Piechnik in the sixth inning.

The Farm then beat Dave Wison Sports of Thunder Bay 9-2, Happy Chef of **M**ankato 2-1, All Car of Green Bay 7-0 and then beat All Car in the final 4-3.

Thus, the two-year hold on the ISC Championship by Pay 'n Pak of Seattle, Washington was broken. The Pak slipped to sixth place, droppping a heartbreaker 1-0 before being eliminated by Decatur 2-1.

With a break from the weatherman and another strong performance from the host Pride, the 42nd edition of the ISC World Tournament could top the Saskatoon affair. Decatur is well equipped for ISC type of competition with outstanding facilities at Borg-Warner Field.




The ISC continues to be the forerunner in the promotion and preservation of fastpitch softball, the original and still most challenging and competitive game in the wide realm of softball.
