

The legendary Ty Stofflet of Allentown, Pa. Sunners, broke a long standing pitching record Sept. 9 at ASA men's major national tournament at Fort Dent Athletic Complex, Tukwila, Wash. Nost wins in any ASA tourney was held by John Spring of Detroit, Mich., at 44. Ty Stofflet broke that record on said date by chalking up his 45th win and celebrated by throwing a no-hitter against Midland, Mich., Merchants, 1-0. Jim Brackin, leading tourney hitter at .562, drove in the run.



Moore, Pack win 2nd straight title

SEATTLE, WASH. (Submitted by John Younger) -- Pay'n Pak of Bellevue, Wash., behind Jimmy Moore's 2-hitter, won its second consecutive ASA men's major national championship Sept. 13 with a 3-0 victory over Penn Corp of Sioux City, Iowa, at Fort Dent Sports Complex in Tukwila. Moore, who was 6-0 in tourney and 50-4 on the season, outdueled Penn Corp's Steve Schultz to win most valuable pitcher award. Schultz gave up two runs in title game before being relieved by Peter Sand-

JIMMY MOORE sets record that may never be beaten! He hurled his Pay'n Pak of Bellevue, Wash., to ASA championship in September and named most valuable pitcher with 6-0 record. He did the same thing in the ISC tournament at Sioux City, Iowa, in August and was MV pitcher. In addition, he hurled Pay'n Pak to United States Olympic Sports Festival gold medal in July. That is practically a duplication of what he accomplished last year. Winning both the ASA and ISC national meets two years in a row is a feat that probably will never be equaled again, say fastpitch authorities.

Pak's rightfielder, Jim Carrithers was selected MVP, while Jim Brackin of Allentown, Pa., Sunners won the tournament batting crown with .542 average....Pau'n Pak won both the ASA and ISC world championship for two years im a row, the only team ever to do so. The Pak also won the 1986 United States Olumpic Sports Festival gold medal in July. Moore also won MVP awards in ASA, ISC and Sports Festival the last two years. (From Page 3) four finishers in the tour nament, Pay'n Pak, Penn Corp, Harold's and Decatur Pride will receive automatic births into next year's ASA major nationals, which will be played at Springfield, Mo. The four teams also will participate in next summer's Olympic Festival...Penn Corp saved ace pitcher Schultz for Harold's Supermarkets Friday night while the Lexington team had only Manager Ron Clawson to throw. It wasn't Clawson's idea to pitch. He had planned to use Doug Middleton, the man who put Harold's in winners' bracket, put Middleton and John Younger, one of team's best hitters, had to return home to resume teaching and coaching duties. Pick-up Pitcher Al Colglazier from Colorado had made the mistake of pitching with an ASA Colorado team in a Memorial Day tournament. ASA officials, after AAL Hanson, commissioner from Utah, reportedly blew the whistle, refused to rule Colglazier's eligibility, and said that Harold's could use Colglazier at its own risk. As result, Harold's lost championship game of winners' bracket to Pay'n Pak, 3-2 and then lost the losers' bracket finals to Penn Corp, 1-0. Harold's finished third and tied the mark for the highest finish by a Missouri entry with 1978 CMI of Springfield. Penn Corp de-

Dave Pfeiffer singled and Kirby Hatcher put down a slap bunt that went deep and didn't allow Penn Corp shortstop any time to throw, putting Pfeiffer at third and Hatcher of first. That brought up Jeff Findley, Harold's leading hitter. But Schultz struck him out. Then Schultz threw the big pitch to Scott Lobeland, who hit one to left side of infield. Pfeiffer was doubled off third and Harold's only chance was history.










